Sharing archaeological heritage: the Archaeological Days across Europe

Tuesday, december 3, 2019, 9:00 to 18:30

Archaeological heritage is a major societal challenge for Europe, whether in terms of protection, conservation, public awareness or education. Thanks to the historical perspective and insight that the longer time-scale allows, archaeology makes it possible, through scientific data, to inform current societal thinking and help sharpen the citizens' critical eye. It was in this spirit that the National Archaeology Days were created in France 10 years ago, in response to strong demand from stakeholders and the public alike. Directed by the Institut national de recherches archéologiques préventives (Inrap) under the aegis of the Ministry of Culture, the 10th National Archaeology Days (JNA) took place in France from Friday 14 to Sunday 16 June 2019.

For the first time, on the occasion of this anniversary edition, the JNAs opened up to Europe: 18 participating countries, 1,160 locations, including fourteen UNESCO World Heritage Sites.

The aim of this workshop was to share a first diagnosis and, on that basis, develop shared prospects for collaboration capable of enabling the development of archaeology days in Europe.

Which audience(s) and communication policies are the best suited for these Archaeology Days in Europe? How should we go about organising a day for school audiences? How can we make this event into a venue where the public can meet with the entire archaeology operating chain?

It is the aim of this participatory workshop to provide answers to these questions, following the review of the 2019 edition, and with a view towards sketching out the next event in 2020.
